

While the Paris Olympic qualifications have recently been published, a number of our athletes are looking to lock in their place for the World Athletic Championships in Budapest, Hungary set to begin on August 19th by achieving the automatic standard, or being ranked in the top 30.

15th July, Coast2 Coast Meeting, Gold Coast, Australia:

Portia Bing is one of those New Zealand athletes looking to cement her place in the New Zealand side for Budapest. At 30 she continues to go fast in the gruelling 400M Hurdles, winning the Gold Coast meet in 56.67s.

18th July, Gyulai István Memorial, Székesfehérvár, 18 July, Hungary:

Tom Walsh continued his run of podium finishes without managing to get on the top step. Of course, when you're competing against Ryan Crouser that is never going to be easy. This time round Tom settled for 3rd with 21.85m to Ryan's winning 22.51m, and Joe Kovacs 22.06m.

19th July, XXXIV Arcobaleno, Celle Ligure, Italy:

Brad Mathas, another Kiwi athlete seeking to secure his spot in the 800m at the World Champs came home 4th in the Men's 800M in 1:46.23s. This continues a run of 1:46s 800m of late for Brad who must be looking to get back down into the 1:45s like he did in June.

Heptathlete Maddie Wilson finished 4th in the Women's 200m in a new PB of 25.06s, and then finished 2nd in the High Jump leaping 1.78M. Fellow Kiwi Heptathlete Imogen Skelton finishing 3rd in the High Jump with 1.75m.

20th July, Spitzen Leichtathletik, Luzern, Switzerland:

Nick Palmer set a new PB of 19.42m in finishing 6th in the Men's Shotput.

Zoe Hobbs continues to run well finishing 2nd in the Women's 100m in 11.08s.

Our Kiwi ladies were again to the fore in the Pole Vault with Eliza McCartney 2nd in 4.65m and Olivia McTaggart 8th in 4.45m.

While a bit down on her recent 63.26m National Record throw, Tori Peeters rounded out a solid meet for the Kiwi's finishing 3rd in the Women's Javelin with 60.83m.

21st July, Diamond League, 36th Herculis EBS, Stade Louis II Monaco, Monaco:

Perhaps the biggest news of the New Zealand athletics week came in the form of Geordie Beamish, who in only his sixth senior competition over the 3000m steeplechase, now finds himself the with a decision on his hands. Having already been selected for the 5000m at the World Championships, Geordie eclipsed Peter Renner's 38-year-old New Zealand National 3000M Steeplechase Record and set a new Oceania Record, finishing 5th in a high-class field in 8:13.26s. This time qualifies Geordie for both the World Championships, and next year's Paris Olympics. The race was won by 20-year-old Kenyan Simon Kiprop Koech in 8:04.19s. Of the 15 finishes in the race, 8 athletes set new PB's.

Other top results saw Karsten Warholm run the 4th fastest 400m Hurdles time in history winning in 46.51s.



Our Antipodean cousins also performed well with Nicola Olyslagers winning the Women's High Jump in 1.99m, with fellow Aussie Eleanor Patterson 4th in a season's best 1.96m. Brooke Buschkuehl finished 6th in the Women's Long Jump in 6.73m.

Without a doubt the event of the night was the Women's Mile. Having already broken World Record's this year in the 1,500m and 5,000m, Kenyan's Faith Kipyegon shattered the World Mile Record by almost 5s, and won the race by 7s in 4:07.64s. Such was the pace 12 of the 13 finishes set PB's, including a PB and Oceania Record to Australia's Jess Hull, who placed 5th in 4:15.34s, 1 place behind Britain's Olympic 1,500m Silver Medallist Laura Muir.

22nd July, Meeting Madrid, Estadio Vallehermoso, Madrid, Spain:

Lauren Bruce finished 3rd in the Women's Hammer Throw with 71.24m, a throw that must go some way to confirming her spot for Budapest. Undoubtedly, she is still looking for that big throw out towards her PB 74.61m, which would see her qualify automatically for the World Champs and for Paris.

A little-known fact (perhaps) is that while Lauren tops the New Zealand Women's Hammer Throw All Time list, one Valarie Adams sits in 7th with 58.32m. Valerie also happens to be 11th on the Discus list.

23rd July, Diamond League, London Stadium, London, England:

Sam Tanner ran another highly competitive 1,500m finishing 10th in 3:31.60s. This is Sam's 2nd sub-3:32s 1,500m in a row. The race was won by relative unknown American Yared Nuguse in 3:30.44s. A home Diamond League for the British, London once again reflected the current strength of British middle distance running with British athlete's finishing 3rd, 4th, 5th and 15th. It was also great to see a return to form for Tasmanian, Australian Stewart McSweyn, who finished 6th in 3:31.42s. Fellow Aussie Adam Spencer finishing 12th in 3:31.81s. In a highly competitive race only 1.5s separated 1st from 12th.

In the Men's Shotput Tom Walsh finally got that big throw out, finishing 2nd with his 4th best throw ever of 22.58m. Although Tom still had to settle for 2nd behind Ryan 'Colossus' Crouser who won with 23.07m, his 22.58m would have beaten Ryan the week before. Jacko Gill finished 5th with 21.22m as he strives to get back into the 22m throws.

Hamish Kerr must be beginning to wonder where the early season form has gone, again missing out on the big 2:30+m leap he is seeking. Hamish finished 6th in the High Jump in 2:24m.

Today in History: July 26th

1267: The inquisition was formed in Rome under Pope Clement IV, so as to allow the Catholic Church to impart its compassion and benevolence on its unsuspecting ~~Laymen~~ blasphemers and ~~Laywomen~~ witches

1533: Continuing on the theme from 1267, Francisco Pizarro ordered the death of the last Sapa Inca Emperor, Atahualpa

1609: English mathematician Thomas Harriot became the first person to draw a map of the Moon by looking through a telescope. This does seem like an obvious thing to do, but to be fair to Thomas the telescope had only recently been invented in 1608

1656: Such is human nature, Dutch painter Rembrandt van Rijn declared himself insolvent after living beyond his means and spending too much on artwork and rare items. As is sometimes the case this adversity led to the most experimental and exuberantly creative period of his career.

1755: That most amorous of Italian gentlemen Giacomo Casanova was arrested in Venice on crimes of an affront to religion and common decency, and was imprisoned in the Doge's Palace

1775: The US Continental Congress founded the United States Post Office (U.S.P.O.) in Philadelphia under Benjamin Franklin

1803: The Surrey Iron Railway, arguably the world's first public railway, opened in south London. This would go on to become part of the Wimbledon-West Croydon line

1847: Moses Gerrish Farmer built the 1st miniature train for children to ride

1865: With a cleverly disguised waft of the derriere in the direction of our more southern Kiwi's, Auckland convinced Parliament to move the capital of New Zealand, and therefore themselves, from Auckland to Wellington

1914: First Lord of the Admiralty (British Minister of Navy) one Winston Churchill ordered the British fleet to remain in state of readiness as threat of war in Europe grows

1917: J. Edgar Hoover gets his first job in the US Department of Justice. Of course, the rest as they say, is history. At the age of 40 he would go on to become the first director of the all-powerful FBI, while still living at home with Mummy.

1944: The first German V-2 rocket hits Great Britain (nicknamed "gasometer").

1947: President Truman signed the National Security Act (1947), establishing the US Department of Defence, CIA, National Security Council and Joint Chiefs of Staff. Although not on this day, years later Donald Trump would make America great again and establish... The United States Space Force!!



1956: Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser announced plan to nationalise the Suez Canal, which initiated the "Suez Crisis" otherwise known as the Second Arab-Israeli war.

1983: Now 40 years old and one of the oldest in track and field (nudge, nudge, wink, wink), Jarmila Kratochvilova of Czech set the woman's 800m world record (1:53.28). It's worth noting that the number of all-time fastest women's 800m times set in the 1980's is probably only bettered by the women's shotput, where despite being a 5x World Champion and 2x Olympic Champion our Val is only number 22 on the all-time list. The list is topped by Natalya Lisovskaya from Russia with a throw dating from 1987. 17 of the 21 throws ahead of Val date from the 1970's and 80's. Suspicious...
